Heritage Corner

In our first newsletter of 2017 we continue with our series of articles highlighting endangered historic places in Ontario. The third installment features the historic Bank of Italy building located at 200 N. Euclid Ave Ontario.

Historic Building: Bank of Italy

On April 18, 1922, the Daily Report newspaper reported the issuance of a \$50,000 permit for the construction of the Security State Bank, located at northeast corner of Euclid Avenue and B Street. The article reported that the new bank would be a "handsome structure" and one of the most attractive banking buildings in all of San Bernardino County. The bank building was designed and constructed by Campbell Construction in 1923 as the permanent office for the Security State Bank. The bank opened to the public on March 24, 1923. The Daily Report covered the grand opening of the bank and stated that "a thing of beauty is a joy forever." The article went on to say that "the transformation of an ugly spot into one of the most beautiful business corners on the famous Euclid Avenue is an achievement in which the whole City may well take pride."

It was even published in a Los Angeles Times Newspaper article dated March 25, 1923 (page 93), "this {Security State Bank} building is a modified Grecian style, construction being of rose marble and brick, with massive columns rising from ground to cornice. The entrance doors are of bronze as are the casements of the great plate-glass windows, which line the street sides of the building, there being no exterior woodwork. The fixtures, lobby floor and lobby desks are all in Napoleon grey marble, with black and gold marble base. The woodwork is of mahogany and the furniture of the same wood harmonizes with the whole."



Two months after its opening, on May 28, 1923, the Security State Bank was taken over by the Bank of Italy after word came out about some of the Bank's questionable loan practices. The Bank of Italy was considered the first state-wide branch-banking system in the United States and by this time it had more than 61 branches established through-out California.

The Bank of Italy was founded in 1904 by Amadeo Pietro Giannini along with five other former directors of the Columbus Bank to serve the needs of the growing immigrant population with headquarters in San Francisco. The Bank of Italy was instrumental in financing the rebuilding of San Francisco after the 1906 earthquake. The Bank of Italy's unorthodox practices included advertising to both borrowers and depositors alike and attracted moderate to lower income customers. Former banks catered to society's aristocrats with certain formalities, conservative polices, and high interest rates. Mr. Giannini was an innovator and saw a great base of untapped customers, extending loans to



the working class, including women. He believed that women who could vote also would demand greater choice and independence in managing their own money.

Giannini and the Bank of Italy pioneered an inter-branch system of banking throughout California that eventually revolutionized the face of banking. This allowed for a greater ease in transferring funds, a critical step in exchanging an efficient branch banking system. The Bank of Italy's approach had democratized and popularized the use of banks. In 1930, Giannini established the Bank of America, which absorbed the Bank of Italy. When the Great Depression hit America, the bank was once again able to withstand the hardships. During the 1930s and 40s, the bank funded much of the agricultural and industrial industries across the country, as well as the movie industry in Southern California.

In 1960 Richard's Beauty School took over the Bank of Italy building. Today it stands vacant and is owned by the City of Ontario.





